Protect Your Pets from Harmful Algal Blooms





Cyanobacteria can form harmful blooms in lakes, ponds, and rivers that make the water murky or look like pea soup or paint. These blooms may produce toxins that could kill or sicken pets.

- •Do not allow your pet to swim in or drink water that may have a bloom.
- •If pets do come into contact with an algal bloom, don't allow pets to groom themselves and rinse them off immediately.
- •If any pet toys are exposed to the algae, thoroughly clean them or throw them away.

Call your vet immediately if your pet has been around an algal bloom and shows symptoms such as vomiting, staggering, drooling, or convulsions.

Are Grain-Free diets Causing Heart Problems for Dogs?

The FDA recently published their third status report on the investigation between certain diets and Canine Dilated Cardiomyopathy (DCM). DCM is a disease of the cardiac muscle that results in a decreased ability of the heart to generate pressure to pump blood through the vascular system. The definitive cause of canine DCM is unknown, although a number of factors including nutritional, infection, and genetic disposition have been implicated.



This disease caught the FDA's attention because of the increase in the number of reports of affected animals rising from 296 between January 1, 2014 and November 30, 2018 to 219 between December 1, 2018 and April 30, 2019.

At this point the FDA has not found any direct correlation between grain-free diets, specific brands, manufacturing processes, or any other of the data points collected by the FDA from the reported cases.

Steven M. Solomon, D.V.M., M.P.H., director of the FDA's Center for Veterinary Medicine said "Our ongoing work in this area is a top priority for the FDA, and as our investigation unfolds and we learn more about this issue, we will make additional updates to the public. In the meantime, because we have not yet determined the nature of this potential link, we continue to encourage consumers to work closely with their veterinarians, who may consult a board-certified veterinary nutritionist, to select the best diet for their pets' needs."

This is not the opinion of Westie Rescue Network. However, after researching this issue and getting input from several veterinarians I personally have changed my dog's diet to a grain inclusive food that has a low percentage of legumes. In addition, I vary the brand and protein sources. The thought is if this is an ingredient or processing issue alternating brands and protein sources should help the problem.






Maggie's Restaurant Reviews


1517 Miner St, Idaho Springs, CO My folks liked the pizza, but we were seated in the ally, not the best location.


