



First day of lockdown in the UK, Bo the westie is ready for his exercise with the household



And the world is being cleansed, blue skies in China, clear water in Venice, happier wildlife.


We are in isolation for a week in Croatia. :( and situation is only geting worse day by day :( I hope everything will be over soon. Stay safe



The last few months have been a difficult time for us as we have lost 2 of our 3 Westies. Both were blessed to make it to 15 years of age, but Duncan passed in early August and Gesse (pronounced Jesse) in early October. For now, only Gizmo remains with his 2 cat brothers, Trouble and Spot.

For those of you who have the green Westie Rescue sweatshirts (used most often for the Saint Patrick's Day parade) or a blue Westie Rescue t-shirt or maybe even a Westie Rescue tote bag, Duncan is the face of the Westie on them. As you can imagine, losing 2 precious Westies within 3 months is difficult. They had been brothers for over 13 years and we would like to share a bit of the accomplishments of these two wonderful guys.

First and foremost, both the boys took on the training of 50 Westie Rescue foster dogs from June 2006 through June 2012, with the adoption of their new brother, Gizmo being the last one in 2012. They

taught each of the rescues the importance of peeing outside, doing sit ups, how to beg and look longingly for treats, how to use a dog door when nature calls and ultimately, how to get along with cats. The boys showed them what a normal loving dog home should be like and each rescue found a similar forever home with loving families.

Duncan passed his certification as a pet therapy dog in early 2009 on the first try and was allowed to represent Westie Rescue at multiple events like Christmas Gift Wrapping at the Tattered Cover and other local book stores. He'd sit/sleep on the gift wrap table then suddenly move and startle the customer who had thought he was a stuffed dog. He was such a big hit with the customers. Such a fun time as well as a profitable donation shift.

Both Duncan and Gesse passed the Canine Good Citizens test on the first try, which allowed them easy access to meet special needs children, visit schools, and schmooze with the seniors at nursing homes. They attended festivals and other events to represent their breed and always had such fun.

Duncan was especially good with children. During one of the interviews to meet a family considering a foster dog the family brought their 9 month old and sat the baby on the floor so it could touch the dogs. Duncan slowly, carefully walked up to the baby and dropped his toy in front of the baby hoping the baby would throw it for him. When he got no response, he nudged his toy closer in between the baby's legs. Then, to everyone's surprise, the baby picked up the small toy and gave is a short toss. Duncan was so excited that he fetched it back and repeated the exercise with the baby. What a special gentle little guy we had. In his life time there was nothing he loved more than catching his toy elephants and bringing them back to be thrown again. Sometimes he'd jump so high to catch them in midair, all four feet left the ground.

Gesse was the pack leader, somewhat aloof but always in charge of the pack and all visiting three and kept everyone in line, reminding them of their place.

Both Gesse and Duncan were novice level earthdog, which is why Marty has an earthdog tunnel in the back yard. There was plenty of excitement when a caged rat was on the premise. Unfortunately, busy times did not allow that passion to get pursued.

We all know how hard it is to lose our fur babies. We just wanted to share knowing a little about these two wonderful Westies who for 6 years worked hard for Westie Rescue and touched a lot of other Westies lives.





Today I celebrate a you that few have seen. I celebrate your unbounded love, courage and the way you like to play. I celebrate your inside life -- a life few will ever see..








